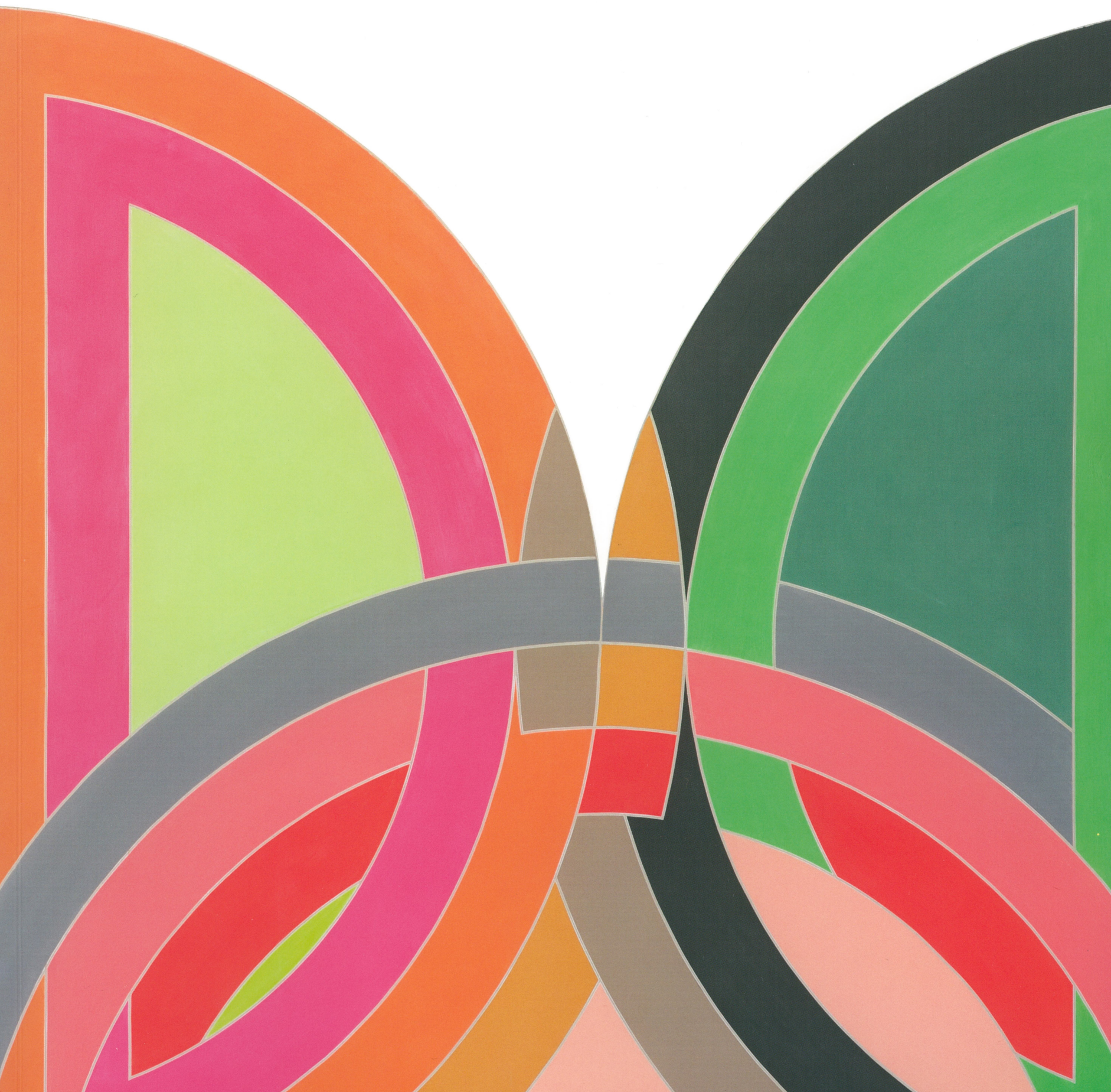

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## 2. JACKSON HOLE, WYOMING

When Eric Logan's client came to him with the idea of constructing a stone tower to store wine on this sprawling Wyoming compound (where Logan had already built a lodge and a combination game room-office-gym), "it would have felt like a European transplant," he says. Instead, Logan persuaded his client to build an oxidized steel-clad silo that picked up on the vernacular structures of the region. "It was a more expressive sculptural steel object intended to create a richer, more layered visual experience," he says. *A bridge leads from the game room-office-gym to the silo, where a spiral stair curls up along walls of reclaimed fir that hold the client's collection of wine.* At the top, a push of a button releases a hatch door, leading visitors to a rooftop deck observatory. "Kind of an Austin Powers moment," jokes Logan, who has enjoyed a bit of eagle-watching from this perch, wine in hand. ▸
