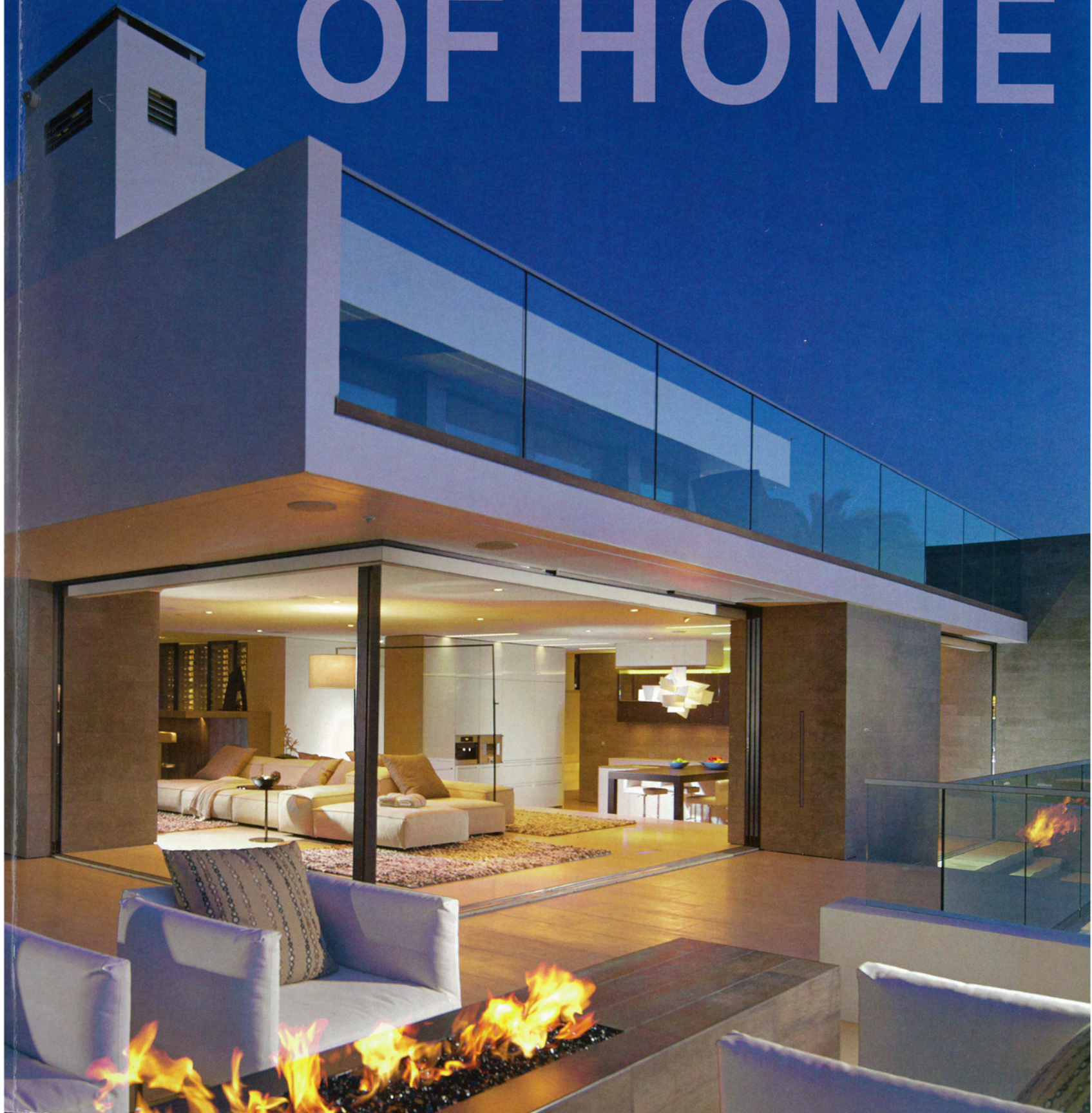

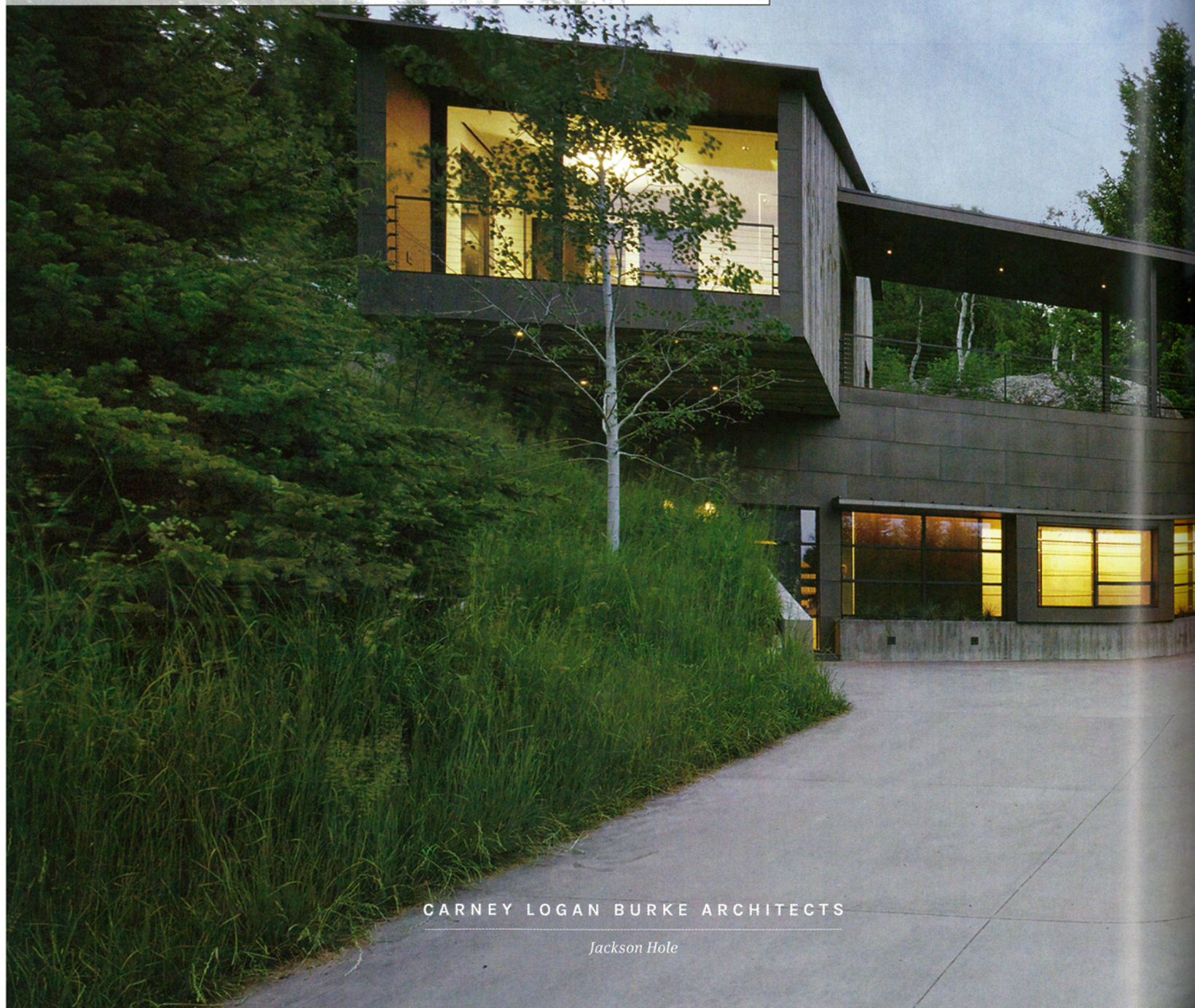
## JACKSON HOLE

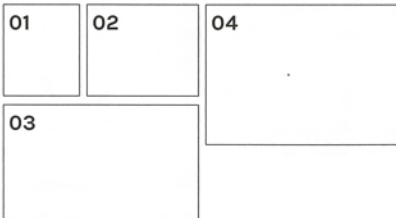

commercial and community projects, including the Laurance S.
